Charitable purposes

The purpose of the organisation is to provide recreational facilities and advance the social needs, health and well being of men of all ages and backgrounds living in Ellon and surrounding area

Summary of the main activities in relation to these objects

- a) Creating, developing and maintaining a facility, namely a Men's Shed.
- b) Offering opportunities for men in the Ellon area to meet and undertake creative, physical, purposeful and recreational activities of their choice.
- c) Reducing isolation of men in the area thus contributing to their physical and mental wellbeing.
- d) Developing the capacity of men in the Ellon area to share their skills and knowledge with others in the community.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the financial period

The last year has been another busy one for the Shed – we've had a good number of new members and visitor numbers are back to pre-Covid visitor numbers. We've made significant changes to the workshops and increased the Activities that the members can do.

As always, I would like to thank all the trustees for their help and hard work over the last year. We do have vacancies for Trustees on the board and would welcome new faces and new ideas.

In terms of membership and visitor numbers – total membership now stands at 206, of course many are infrequent visitors or 'sleeping members'. We have a good number (over 40) of 'core' members who attend on a regular basis. In terms of visits to the Shed this has shown a progressive increase over the last 3 years – the average visits per week was 16 in 2020; 23 in 2021, 38 in 2022 and 47 in 2023. As I mentioned last year, we also several of people who visit the Shed show a great deal of enthusiasm but don't return. We need to try and understand why this is the case.

Sadly, we lost two Shed members this year - Robert Bruce and Gordon Mincher. Robert was fairlynew to the Shed but was enthusiastically getting involved and the Shed was becoming an import part of his life. Gordon was a long-term member, a former Trustee, a very regular attendee and someone we all respected and regarded as a friend. We were honoured by both their family's making significant donations to their Shed, gifting us the donations made at the funerals.

The main activities of members continues to be woodworking, furniture refurbishment, and gardening but we have a significant other activities: bike restoration, 3D printing, picture framing and model railway. Examples of items made includes: benches, log stores, bird tables, signposts, hedgehog boxes, tortoise house, wooden mushrooms, house signs and window boxes. We have restored or repaired a wide range of items including old picture frames, a WWI ditty box, a Triang pedal car (thanks to Bill Higgins for most of the work) and furniture.

Indoor workspace continues to be a challenge for us. We finished the partition in the portacabin to separate the CNC from picture framing, model making etc.. We finished installing the garden shed and have re-jigged bike storage using £400 grant from Rotary.

We continue to upgrade equipment in the workshops when we get the opportunity – swapping out a Record Power lathe for a better version. We have completely revamped the extraction and ventilation system for the workshop – thanks to Charlie for his significant efforts doing this.

The CNC machine that we acquired in 2022 is getting more use. There is a significant learning curve for those wanting to use it and John Urquhart and Charlie Forest have been training others, creating bespoke items and running demonstrations at the Open Day. Ralph Watson is now using the machine to create bespoke tables for his bonsai trees.

We received numerous donations of tools (manual and powered) through the year. Where appropriate we use them ourselves or we offer them to other sheds, members or to Tools for Africa.

On the gardening front the polytunnel was well used last summer – with lots of tomatoes and other veg. And Richard Jones has used one of the greenhouses to grow heritage tomatoes – lovely they are too. Several Shed members and their wives helped out at the opening of Parkvilla Garden in Ellon under the Scotland Garden Scheme on the 8 & 9th July – to raise money for a number of charities (including the Shed). The Shed received £234.60. They helped out by serving teas/cakes and welcoming visitors on the day, and by baking cakes beforehand.

Harry Emslie has continued with his terrific gardening work at Ythanvale and has been largely responsible for maintaining their gardens. Thanks go to Harry who has done a terrific job at Ythanvale. In late April we had a surprise in the email – we were contacted by the George Crombie Trust who wished to award us £1200 to support our activities. This will be used to help fund our underlying running costs, which, like everyone else's, are increasing rapidly.

In terms of other funding we received a further £2900 in grant funding – which is great and helps remain in a healthy financial situation.

In terms of 'external' events. We held an open day 13th May giving visitors a chance to have a look round, see what we are doing, play with the railway and, of course, have tea, cake and burgers. On the 11th May we started a new initiative. We are working with Aberdeenshire, Community Learning and Development (CLD) Service to provide help with IT skills to those who would like help. We are acutely aware that IT/computer skills are needed for many important basic activities (eg booking NHS appointments, repeat prescriptions, shopping) and that many people struggle to master the skills. We are offering drop-in sessions (Thursdays at 1-2.30pm) for anyone who wants help. Aberchirder Men's Shed has very successfully offered this service to their community.

The drop in sessions run by Zuzi Jatelova have proved to be very popular – not least because of Zuzi's engaging and bubbly character! Following the example set by Aberchirder Shed, 2 of our members are going for SVQ qualifications so they can carry on and expand the training.

On 22nd June we hosted Ellon Probus for a summer BBQ with Duncan Rennie giving a coopering demonstration. The weather was kind, the burgers were excellent and Duncan gave an excellent demonstration.

On the 2nd December we held a pre-Christmas Open Day. A big thank you goes to Colin Gibb & Mike Bruce for their efforts making santas and to George Robb for his LED light ornaments.

We held two fund raising guizzes at McDonald Golf Club raising c £1350.

With the cost of living crisis affecting the pockets of many people. We again decided to the Shed as a 'Winter Café' for adults to come for warmth, company, refreshment and food. We opened from every second Wednesday through November until late February. Attendance was variable (zero to 20). To be honest few, if any, of those attending were 'needy' but on the busy days a good time was had by all.

To conclude. I look forward to the rest of 2024.

In our efforts to increase indoor workspace we submitted a pre-planning guidance request to Aberdeenshire Council Planning department for a new portacabin. We asked for guidance on 2 options – on top of the existing cabin and next to the current one (along the fence). The latter option was given a positive review (putting it on top of the current cabin was ruled out). We will now submit a full planning application (and offers to help would be gratefully received).

Assuming we get another portacabin it will mean a number of things: To manage the power supply we will investigate solar panels and a battery system We will need to re-jig car parking and likely shift disabled parking to immediately in front of the shed (so need to move the bike racks etc.) We will need to have a top to bottom review of how we use our indoor space - this might mean we will need to move some things around We will also be forming a workshops users group who with work with the Workshop Supervisor to review how we use the workshop(s) and to make recommendations to the Board on the layout and equipment in the main workshop. Our lease runs out in 2030. We have to submit a new CAT proposal to enter negotiations for a long term lease. For members have offered to help lead this process which is just getting underway. We, with the help of John Urquhart, are in the process of reviewing our constitution – it needs to be brought up to date to make sure it isn't an obstacle to our CAT (or funding) applications.


